

Principles of Oil Painting *Beginner* – Supply List

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**** Note:** If you already own any paint/brush/panel/easel, you can bring it with you. The following supplies are only recommendations based on my years of trial and error. Feel free to choose your own brand if you like. That being said, supplies do affect the quality of your work. A student grade panel will be very frustrating to work with and will not produce good results. Student grade paint will not have enough pigment so you will use a lot more. Cheap brushes will fall apart after 2-3 uses. My advice: buy the best you can afford. It's an investment in yourself and your passion!

Paints:

Brands: We want to choose high-quality paints, not student grade. They will last for quite a while, so purchase the best you can afford. My preferred brands are: **Rembrandt, M. Graham, Michael Harding, Gamblin**. Blick's Pasadena carries all these brands in the store and on line. These paints require solvent for clean-up and thinning. If you are allergic to solvents, I recommend Cobra or Winsor/Newton water soluble oil paints, but you have to order these on-line from Blick's or Jerry's. They don't carry Cobra in the store. The advantage of Cobra is that you can use water as medium or for clean-up.

Colors:

For **economic option**, you can purchase an introductory set from one of these brands and gradually add paints of your choice.

If you prefer to buy paint individually, we want warm and cool of each primary (Y,R,B). We also want to work with as few paints as possible and use color theory to build from existing primary colors. This is called a limited palette and creates much better color harmony. For yellows and red you have the option to go Cadmium free or Cadmium colors.

Yellows:

Cadmium free option: Permanent Yellow light, Permanent yellow medium, Yellow ochre, Naples yellow deep

Cadmium option: Cad yellow light, cad yellow medium, Same yellow ochre, Naples yellow deep as above

Red:

Cadmium free option: Quinacridone Rose or Alizarin Crimson, Any light red (optional, I like M Graham Azo coral for light red), Any medium red

Cad option: Cad red light, cad red medium, same Quinacridone Rose, or Alizarin Crimson

Blue:

Ultramarine Blue, Cobalt Blue, Sky blue (optional)

White:

Titanium white

Other colors:

Ivory black, Viridian green, Transparent red oxide

***Note:** Cadmium based colors are very intense and rich in terms of pigment and chroma. A little goes a very long way. They are more expensive, however. The same effect can be accomplished with non-cad paints but requires the use of more paint. It's your choice if you like to use cadmium-based colors. If you decide to buy the cad option, you need to protect your skin from direct contact. I recommend wearing gloves for plein air b/c paint will find its way on your hands and face eventually and washing your hands outdoors is not always possible.

Solvent:

Gamsol. For cleaning brushes and thinning paint.

Medium:

Few options are: Gamblin solvent free gel (my fav), or 2 parts gamsol, 1 part seed oil (walnut, linseed), or Windsor and Newton artist medium

Container tin can for carrying solvent:

For long term use, I also highly recommend Rosemary brushes Ivory series (Flat and flat long 2,3,4,5,6), but they are in England and you have to have the brushes shipped (not expensive, \$10-15 for shipping).

Easel and tripod:

A few scenarios here:

- o If you are on a tight budget, buy anything you can set up outside or on a table. French easels or table easels do the job on a budget. You can ask the people at Blick's for recommendations or search Amazon for the ones you like. You could also buy a paint box (plein air easel) and tripod separately, but the paint box needs to be made for plein air use and have the attachment for tripods.
